Born Free provides care for an array of rescued animals every year. We step in to help rescue, rehabilitate and find homes for abused, captive wild animals, and we campaign for an end to wild animal exploitation and suffering. We also work with and support partner organisations to provide a safety net for wild animals across the world, enabling the rescue and care of thousands of neglected and exploited captive wild animals and the protection of animals in the wild – where they belong.

The way that wild animals are used by humans for 'entertainment' seems to know no bounds. Whether this is through the legal and illegal pet trade, the circus industry, being used as 'photo props' for #Selfishselfies, zoo performances, as 'pets' or in private breeding facilities...the reality is the same, these animals are deprived of the life nature intended for them. They often live in appalling unnatural conditions, without space, friends of their own kind, choice, or the ability to express natural behaviours. They may be terrified, fighting for their very survival, or worse, waiting for death. They deserve better!

Wildlife crime, and particularly the illegal wildlife trade, is big business and it's on the rise. Did you know it is the fourth largest illegal trade in the world – only arms, drugs and people trafficking are worth more money?

This multi-billion-dollar industry increasingly involves organised criminal gangs, who see wildlife as a low risk, high-value commodity. Every year, millions of wild animals are brutally shot, trapped, poisoned, and mutilated, or kept in appalling conditions and traded by criminal networks.

Wildlife crime is becoming increasingly sophisticated – criminals are using complex technology and weaponry, non-traditional trade routes and increasing levels of violence. Creative accounting methods, shell companies, and tax havens are being used to hide the financial profits of this disgusting trade. In addition, rebel militias are using profits from the illegal wildlife trade as a way of funding their campaigns of insecurity and terror.

Live wild animals are widely-traded by these criminal networks, often taken when they are young, their parents killed. These animals do not get the right nutrition and care at the start of their lives which, should they survive, leads to ongoing health problems as they grow, an additional problem to add to their already grim prospects as a wild animal kept in captivity. Stolen animals often end up as 'exotic' pets in the United States, Europe, or Japan, while many never leave their native countries, being installed in hotels and restaurants to attract customers.

## WHAT HAPPENS TO CONFISCATED ANIMALS?

Despite a lack of training, capacity and resources, many authorities in countries across the world are doing what they can to counter this terrible trade. However, there are often huge landscapes to cover and limited resources to carry out effective anti-poaching and wildlife law-enforcement, so illegality continues to flourish. Some animals are intercepted and apprehended, yet once a wild animal has been confiscated from an owner or a trafficker, that is often not the end of its woes as inadequate legislation, rescue facilities and welfare training means that animals are rarely looked after in a way that protects their safety and wellbeing.

Illegally traded wild animals face huge issues; disease, injury, functional impairment, environmental challenges (such as temperature extremes), behavioural or interactive restrictions; anxiety, fear, pain, distress; and food and water deprivation or malnutrition.



Live animals rescued from traffickers and taken into custody by enforcement agents can be re-victimised. For example, animals confiscated and seized may be:

- Housed long-term in unsuitable accommodation, as the authorities have nowhere to pass the animals on to, or they do not have adequate guidance, protocols and training to ensure the welfare of the confiscated animal;
- They are often placed in zoos many of which have inadequate infrastructure/space/funds/ expertise to care for the animals. If rehomed to zoos, there is also a risk they will be used in performances - in countries where that is still allowed:
- Rehomed to unregulated and unlicensed organisations, which may return them to the illegal trade:
- Killed because there is nowhere suitable to home them. Those not euthanised, will, with few exceptions, experience the rest of their lives in captivity.

### BORN FREE'S WORK TO HELP CAPTIVE ANIMALS

Repatriation of wildlife can be difficult, not least if the country of origin is unknown, as well as expensive – including housing and transportation back to their country of origin. Animals may not survive the journey or their country of origin might reject them as such captive animals may introduce diseases into wild populations.



This is where Born Free and our supporters come in and make a real difference. We are a group of people who care passionately about individual animals and are determined to end wild animal exploitation. We work tirelessly to ensure that all wild animals, whether living in captivity or in the wild, are treated with compassion and respect and can live their lives according to their needs. Born Free's work to improve wild animal welfare around the world focuses on areas where we can have most impact.

Rescuing a wild animal is just the first step in ensuring their second chance at a new life. Born Free works in partnership with other rescue organisations around the world. We may not have people on the frontline (except in Ethiopia where we have a rescue sanctuary but not the legal authority to confiscate animals and in South Africa where we have a co-management agreement with our friends at Shamwari), to enable us to step in and take animals out of their horrendous situations, but we work with and support partners who can take this first step with us.

In early 2019, Born Free became aware of the lions and their heart-breaking story, and

rescue centre near Lyon.

And rescue is not the whole story. Each individual animal needs to recover, be rehabilitated, and then either released or given an appropriate lifetime care home in which to spend the rest of their lives...this is also Born Free's commitment.

Where possible, we release rehabilitated rescue animals back into the wild. Sadly, many of those we rescue have been too damaged by their previous experience for this to be a realistic outcome, but our sanctuaries and those we support offer the next best option, a place they can live in peace, free from harm, and with the best care to meet their needs.

We currently provide lifetime care to nearly 200 wild animals and our rescue efforts continue.

Without the generosity of our amazing supporters, the vital work that our team does would be impossible.

The passion of our Animal Care team ensures the well-being of the big cats in our care and the dedication of our Education team who work tirelessly in our local communities and schools to spread the message of 'Keeping Wildlife in the Wild'.

Balozi, Lekanya, Kamegelo and Mahaba, likely bred in captivity and sold illegally as pets in Belgium, were given a fresh start on African soil. The four servals made their epic journey from Brussels, Belgium, to Cape Town, South Africa, in specialist transport crates and climate-controlled conditions. When they reached their destination and forever home, our friends at Panthera Africa were delighted to see the servals relaxed, gently walking out of their crates into their night-houses, immediately taking their first meal and drink of water and, very soon after, confidently and curiously starting to explore their large enclosures.

Since their confiscation in 2019 and 2021, the servals were cared for by an expert, dedicated team at Natuurhulpcentrum, a wildlife rescue centre in Belgium, but they needed a lifetime home. So, when Born Free heard about the cats, we knew we could help by offering them a future in the Born Free Rescue Section at Panthera Africa Big Cat Sanctuary near Cape Town. We funded and built four new enclosures designed especially for the needs of the servals. And it is here, nestled in the South African landscape, surrounded by space, naturally occurring vegetation, and with purpose-built climbing platforms and a night house, that the servals are now relaxing and adjusting to their new life.





# MAKING A VITAL CONTRIBUTION TO

This is where we need your help most as Born Free Champions in 2023/4. To continue our essential work, there is a pressing need for funds. The cost of feed, veterinary care and any medication, as well as maintaining the wild sanctuaries, and staffing them with well qualified people, all needs funding.

LIFETIME CARE IN 2023/4

For example, to pay for standard veterinary care for a rescued lion is £610 annually; to pay for a lion's food for a year is around £3,900 and £978 for a serval. The costs below are the main financial commitment of our Rescue and Care programme:
