## An Elephant Called 'Slowly' - Should Animals Have The Same Rights As Humans?

This 90 minute workshop explores the real story of Pole Pole the elephant (Swahili for 'Slowly'), and discusses whether she should be sent to live at the zoo, or remain with/return to her family in the wild. Children work in groups as different stakeholders (a UK zoo, an African government and Pole Pole), sharing their thoughts and opinions, before voting as a class as to whether to send Pole Pole to the zoo. Pupils will then be told the real story of Pole Pole. It's a great way to start discussions around the ethics of holding wild animals in captivity.

Suitable for KS2, can be adjusted for KS3

### **Precious Primates**

This 60-75 minute workshop enables pupils to discover more about tropical rainforests, their geographic distribution, make-up and importance, as well as introducing them to some of the amazing primates found there. Pupils will learn about and hear stories from some of the primates that Born Free works to protect, before writing short speeches highlighting why the rainforest is important to them, and how we can all protect primates.

Suitable for KS2, can be adjusted for KS3

### **Threats Facing Wildlife - Primary**

This can either be run as a shorter assembly or as a 60 minute workshop. We introduce pupils to four key species that Born Free cares for, elephants, tigers, orca and hedgehogs. Pupils will learn interesting facts about each species and learn about the threats they face. They will also learn how they can each make small changes in their daily lives to help protect each of the species above.

## **Threats Facing Wildlife - Secondary**


This 60 minute workshop takes an in-depth look at four key threats facing wildlife around the globe: habitat loss, human-wildlife conflict, the illegal wildlife trade and trophy hunting. Classes will also find out what organisations like Born Free are doing to help halt species decline, and how they too can take action to help wild species.

#### **Conservation Or Con?**

This 60 minute lesson aims to highlight the role of conservation volunteers in the canned hunting industry in South Africa. It is especially suitable for groups considering gap year programmes working with wildlife or those studying travel and tourism.

This programme aims to:
