

- Policy to stop exploitation and promote global wild-animal friendly legal protections.

WHY US?

Wild animals are our best allies in the fight against climate change

Every species plays a vital role in maintaining the biodiversity of our planet. Just one African forest elephant captures £2 million* of carbon in its lifetime. Wild orca play a key role as quardians of the ocean - as much as 80% of the world's oxygen is produced by phytoplankton and seaweed, taking up carbon dioxide as they photosynthesize. Gorillas help maintain the health of the rainforest - trees growing from seeds in their droppings take in carbon dioxide, store carbon, release oxygen and pump water vapour into the atmosphere. As apex predators, tigers maintain the health of India's forest ecosystems and their conservation helps prevent carbon dioxide emissions, saving £76 million in carbon.

Born Free protects wild animals and their natural habitats so they can continue their important roles in maintaining the planet's fragile ecosystems.

BIG CAT RESCUES

We rescue animals in need

We rescue captive animals from exploitative situations and where possible release them back into the wild, or re-home in one of our world-class sanctuaries. We also rescue snared and injured animals in the wild, providing care before release, and have patrols on the ground to reduce illegal hunting. Today we care for 41 rescued big cats, including Simba, pictured here. A tiny cub when dumped in a Russian garage, he was a victim of wildlife trade. We gave him a life worth living at a sanctuary in Italy. Meanwhile in Ethiopia, we rescued two cheetahs from illegal trade, and in South Africa gave a home to a mother and daughter leopard duo rescued from an illegal breeding facility in Poland, and two lions exploited in Ukraine.



TIGERS & RHINOS ON THE UP!



Since our work began in India in 2004, we have helped more than double the number of tigers to 3,682.



Black and white rhino populations have increased by 72% since our work began in Kenya in 2014.

We make lasting change

Our policy work has seen a domestic ban on the UK's ivory trade including an extension to include hippo and walrus teeth and whale ivory. Other policy successes include helping persuade the UN to agree historic resolutions on wildlife trafficking and biodiversity, a new UK law recognising animals as sentient beings and inclusion of animal cruelty in a new UK online safety bill.

We innovate to help humans and wildlife live in harmony

Habitat loss can lead to conflict between people and wild animals. If elephants raid crops, or big cats hunt livestock, they can be killed by farmers in retaliation. We use simple, cost-effective solutions to help people and wildlife live in harmony. Our strategies include installing beehive fences to deter elephants, painting 'eyes' on cattle rumps to alarm predators, and reinforcing bomas (enclosures) to stop predators from attacking livestock.


